Quick Guide to Immigration Issues on Campus - 2019 Dan Berger and Stephen Yale-Loehr

This document summarizes key immigration issues to understand and follow this year. More details on each point are in the links.

Students

- The USCIS Unlawful Presence Memo, which made a myriad of student visa violations retroactive, is on hold by injunction, thanks in part to a 2018 amicus brief signed by over 60 schools.
- A court challenge threatens student work authorization (OPT). Schools are invited to join an *amicus* brief. ICE has started STEM OPT site visits.
- <u>Discretionary visa denials</u> are on the rise, especially Middle Eastern students over the past few months at airports and consulates.
- The Supreme Court upheld the <u>travel ban</u>, and it could be expanded to other countries.
- Court challenges are temporarily keeping discretionary programs such as DACA and TPS
 alive. The Supreme Court will likely rule on DACA next spring. Schools are invited to join
 an <u>amicus</u> brief on DACA.
- The <u>Dream and Promise Act</u> has passed the House, but is not moving in the Senate.
- A new <u>"public charge" regulation</u> is discouraging foreign nationals from accessing government programs.

Scholars and Professors

- H-1Bs are being scrutinized, particularly where the job does not require a specific degree.
- <u>Security checks</u> are delaying scientists and engineers, especially from China, Russia and the Middle East.
- Some spouses of H-1B visa holders may lose their ability to work later this year.

Overall Recommendations

- Address mental health consequences of immigration policy. Consider adding counseling resources to visa law presentations to help overcome cultural barriers.
- Be ready for more scrutiny as part of the President's "Extreme Vetting" and "Buy American/Hire American" executive orders. This means longer processing times for everything from <u>student work cards</u> to visa interviews to <u>green cards</u>.
- Have clear point people on campus there are many rumors swirling around.
- Collect campus data to support advocacy at the state (e.g. <u>drivers licenses</u>, <u>NJ schools letter</u>,) and federal levels (e.g., <u>StartUp Act</u> to help entrepreneurs, <u>Believe Act</u> to reform employment-based immigration, <u>House Fairness bill a start for reform</u>, <u>but some flaws</u>).
- Support continuing education and government liaison efforts of international advisers. With new leadership at various agencies, immigration will likely continue to get more challenging.
